



The Soulmate Myth

Humans are designed with the capacity to make meaningful and long-term relationships. We have an inner desire for connection and oneness with a special someone. We are healthier people when we have close relationships, and we suffer when we're isolated and alone. One way we seek this kind of belonging is through dating and marriage. But as in everything, there is a wise way and a foolish way to go about building this kind of relationship.

Jason S. Carroll, a professor in the School of Family Life at Brigham Young University, says there are two common approaches to dating and marriage in the U.S. today. The first is called the Soulmate Model of Marriage. The soulmate approach believes that there is just one ideal person out there for me, and thus the goal of relationships is to find that person. People ask themselves questions like "Is this the person I am supposed to be with?" or "Can I find a better partner?" and "Is my partner making me happy?" Interestingly, this is the predominant belief about partner relationships in the U.S. "A 2021 YouGov poll of nearly 15, 000 U.S. adults found that 60% of respondents believe in the idea of soulmates." Many people don't think there's any harm in believing in the soulmate approach. But Carroll says that there are three risks of soulmate thinking.

- 1. Unrealistic expectations. "One of the greatest risks of soulmate thinking is the way that it shapes young adults toward unrealistic expectations about how healthy relationships come together and what makes them succeed." Often people with destinythinking think that they will be happy if they can just find the right and ideal person. Soulmate beliefs orient people to think that finding love is all about destiny and that relationships are either meant to be or are not. They discount the need to grow relationship skills.
- 2. Unhealthy dating trajectories. "Sometimes, soulmate perspectives create a sort of 'dating

- paralyzes' among young adults. The crushing quest to find 'the one person' they are supposed to be with makes them fearful of making a wrong decision.... Soulmate logic assures young people that they 'will be sure' when they have found their soulmate, so any indecision or lack of certainty means it's safer to end the relationship...." But for others, "soulmate thinking can also have the opposite effect. They become convinced very quickly that their partner is their soulmate, so they jump into 'rushed dating' or rapid courtship", and thus don't take the time to adequately judge compatibility.
- 3. Unresolvable break-ups. Carroll says, "I have become convinced that one of the greatest harms occurs when relationships end. I have counseled dozens of young adults who are unable to successfully cope and move forward in healthy ways after a serious dating relationship has ended due to the belief that their soulmate is walking away from them and there are no other options in the future." These people disregard their own agency and the reality that there are multiple options.

In summary, "The model of soulmate marriage fails because it promises the fruits of fulfillment, connection, and intimacy, without providing the roots needed to make those fruits possible." So, what are the "roots" of growing a healthy relationship?

The roots of healthy relationships are found in the second model of dating and marriage. It's called "The Only One" approach. In this approach a meaningful and lasting relationship is not found, it is made. Carrol says, "This... connection grows out of adapting to each other, caring for one another's needs, and developing a shared history of experiences.... It's about making someone the only one of your heart – and keeping him or her there as you navigate the ups and downs of life together." Instead of "destiny beliefs", you have "growth beliefs"

Carroll says, "Only-one marriages are true partnerships in which spouses are devoted to creating a shared life together that is larger than the emotional payoff of the marriage. This view of marriage gives us more than feelings of happiness; it helps make our lives rich and meaningful."

The idea that there is just one, ideal person in the cosmos that you could build a meaningful life with is just a myth. The better approach is to accept the responsibility that it takes two people to build, grow, and make a meaningful and lasting relationship. Then, when you find someone you're compatible with, build the relationship with love, respect, and a commitment to an "only-one" kind of marriage. This is God's design as seen in Genesis 2:24, "That is why a man leaves his father and mother and is united to his wife, and they become one flesh." May God bless your relationships as you grow in your devotion to one person. Here for you.
