



The Unbending Message

And Jesus said, 'Follow me, and I will make you become fishers of men."

— Mark 1:17

From the onset Jesus' call was to save men. In just three years, spent mostly in a section of Galilee the size of York County, he would train and commission a band of followers to spread His message to the whole world (Mt 28:16-20; Mk 16:15-16; Lk 24:45-49).

What was that message? Luke outlines its core:

'The Christ will suffer and rise from the dead on the third day and in His name repentance and forgiveness of sins will be proclaimed to all nations, beginning in Jerusalem."

- Luke 24:46b-47

A risen Christ, repentance, forgiveness of sins, beginning in Jerusalem. The exact planks of Peter's message a couple of weeks later on Pentecost (Acts 2:36-38). Three thousand accepted his message that very day, were baptized, and added to the church.

Continuing through Acts, we learn much about that message.

The message was transcendent. It never changed throughout Acts. From Jewish Jerusalem, through pagan Asia Minor and Greece, all the way to Imperial Rome, the message was identical. The apostle Paul

"... declared first to those in Damascus, then in Jerusalem and throughout all the region of Judea, and also to the Gentiles, that they should repent and turn to God, performing deeds in keeping with their repentance."

Acts 26:19b-20

Paul conceded that his preaching offered neither "eloquence or superior wisdom" nor "wise and

persuasive words" (1 Corinthians 2:1-4). It wasn't flashy and even seemed to bore some (2 Corinthians 10:10). His message stuck to the fundamentals: "Jesus Christ and him crucified", "prove your repentance by how you live" (Acts 26:10) thus becoming "a demonstration of the Spirit's power".

The message never acquiesced to culture. Already I can hear throngs shouting, "Wait! What about "becoming all things to all men?" (1 Corinthians 9:20-22) Follow me for a minute.

Paul's conversion piqued concerns. Disciples in Jerusalem initially were fearful of the "new" Paul (Acts 9:26-29). Later, other Judean Christians seemed squeamish as they heard he was "preaching the faith he once tried to destroy" (Galatians 1:23). Years later in Jerusalem, Paul eagerly presented to the other apostles exactly what he believed and taught. The result? "Those men added nothing to my message". (Galatians 2:6)

Get it? Decades into church history, be it to Jews, to gentiles, in all cultures, in all places, the apostles' message was still unified, unaltered, and unadorned.

Becoming "all things to all men" did not change the message: Repent, turn to Christ, and show what you claim to believe in how you live. When around Jews, Paul "became" (though he always was) a Jew. He circumcised Timothy (Acts 16:3), "because of the Jews who lived in the area"— in other words, to "win the Jews". That same Paul would not circumcise Titus (Galatians 2:3) to placate the Judaizers— his arch-critics!— who insisted that one must become a Jew in order to

become a Christian. Paul was flexible on methodology, but never on message.

Children's for Ecuador:

Giving:

The message was unbending. This inflexibility offended some cultural and social sensibilities. It was unapologetically exclusive. The message was intolerant, allowing not a single accommodation or redaction for special groups or for the trendy dictates of "higher learning":

In the past God overlooked such ignorance, but now he commands all people everywhere to repent. — Paul to the Areopagus, Acts 17:30

Most gentiles considered the message as foolishness; Jews, a stumbling block many refused to overcome (1 Corinthians 1:18-25). But "God was pleased through the foolishness of what was preached to save those who believed." (:21) Yet Peter, John, Stephen, Paul, Barnabas, Apollos, et al. were unyielding, and bore on their bodies the blows they'd taken for refusing to adapt the message to placate the demands of outspoken and even hostile cultural groups.

And the church grew.
