Around this time every year falls the Jewish festival of Hanukkah, a weeklong commemoration with an interesting background and connection to Jesus.

Hanukkah might be the best known Jewish feast not commanded in the Bible. Its story starts around 170 B.C.—long after the close of Old Testament history—when a Seleucid (Syrian) king named Antiochus IV came along and upset a 150-year equilibrium that had allowed Jews to keep their culture and worship God under semi-autonomous governance dating back to the Ptolemies. Armed with ambition matched only by his penchant for self-aggrandisement, Anticochus IV felt Judea had resisted Hellenization long enough. It was time to turn the Jews into Greeks.

Antiochus IV took on the name "Epiphanes" (God Manifest) and set up his own high priest in Jerusalem. But while Antiochus Epiphanes was on a campaign in Egypt, the usurped high priest mustered an army, raided the Holy City, and killed the king's appointee. Antiochus IV raced back from Egypt and "raging like a wild animal ... took Jerusalem by storm." (2 Maccabees 5:11). He proceeded to ban the Sabbath, circumcision, all Jewish feasts, as well as the mere possession of the Holy Scriptures. He openly sacrificed pigs in the Temple and filled its courts with drunken hedonism. He erected a statue of Zeus in his own likeness above the altar and demanded its worship. He forced Jews, on penalty of death, to eat pork. Most did. (Would you? Maybe if it was bacon?)

Anticohus then sent emissaries to enforce his edicts throughout the land.

Enter a little country town name Modi'in. When the king's emissary showed up and demanded they sacrifice to Zeus, their aging priest, a man named Mattathias, told 'em to go pound sand. When another Jew volunteered to perform the sacrifice, Mattathias killed both him and the royal emissary. He knew what that meant. It meant the king's army was on its way.

Mattathias and his five sons headed for the hills. They hunkered down in the Judean countryside and, under the command of Mattathias' third son Judah, they launched a three-year guerilla war that defied all odds and began routing the Seleucids. His fierce agility in battle earned him the moniker "Judah Maccabbeus", literally, "Judas the Hammer".

The Hammer went on to recapture Jerusalem, purged it of idols, and gave the defiled and desolate Temple an extreme makeover. In December 164 B.C., he rededicated the Temple and sacrifices again were offered to Yahweh. Judas The Hammer then held an eight-day "Hanukkah" or "Feast of Dedication".

Many don't realize that Hanukkah actually turns up in the gospels, in John 10, where it's called the Feast of Dedication. But why was Jesus there? To Jews, Hanukkah was sort of "Thanksgiving meets the 4th of July", a patriotic time for giving thanks to God for his providence in protecting their faith and way of life. It was a time Jesus might have expected to hear some messianic chatter, and indeed he did. "If you are the Christ, tell us plainly", the Jews demanded (10:24). Jesus had told them, but they were dull to hear. In verse 30 Jesus threw down a "hammer" of his own, "I and the Father are one". Jaws dropped, blood boiled, and Jews nearly stoned him on the spot.

You see, it was not lost on those Jews that 200 years earlier, in this same Temple, Antiochus Epiphanes rose and proclaimed the exact same thing. He set himself up as god, demanded the Jews worship him, and this very feast was to celebrate God's deliverance from the clutches of the Seleucids by The Hammer. There could hardly have been a more fitting moment for Jesus to pronounce himself "God Manifest", Jesus Epiphanes.

This time, would they side with Yahweh and recognize their deliverer? Someone much greater than "The Hammer" now stood before them. The true redeemer of all mankind. He was God Manifest, all the fullness of God in bodily form (Colossians 2:9).

Christians live year round with our faith and beliefs often besieged by our own flesh as well as the armies of cultural secularism. How appropriate would it be if we made this a season of cleansing and rededication as well? A time to refocus on what matters. What if, in the little country town of York, we drew inspiration from that old priest Mattathias and told the world and its encroaching values to go pound sand? How mightily would God deliver our families, congregation, and community if we placed Jesus, "God Manifest" prominently on display in all we think, do, and proclaim?
